PATIENT PROFILE

Living Recovery...a hopeful future

Roughly 22.3 million Americans, more than nine percent of adults, live in recovery after some form of substance-use disorder according to a peer-reviewed study published in 2021. A separate study published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the National Institute on Drug Abuse in 2020 found three out of four people who experience addiction eventually recover. That means 75 percent recover which goes against our cultural perception that people never get better.

Stephanie Novello is proof of that. At 37 years old, she has been in recovery from alcohol and methamphetamine (meth) since August 2020 thanks in part to Health Partnership Clinic (HPC). She is a mother of three, ranging from 20 to seven years old, lives in Osawatomie, Kan. and is a successful business owner. Today the future looks bright but a couple of years ago she was facing prison and an uncertain future.

Looking back there were many barriers to overcome. Stephanie hailed from a family of addiction and dysfunction coupled with poverty, teen pregnancy, low self-esteem and no real support.

That vulnerability and trauma led Stephanie to someone who abused her both physically and emotionally for the next six years. "To cope and take away the emotional, mental and physical pain, I began to drink," she reflects. "I got a DUI at the age of 20 and that was a wakeup call for me."

Now with two children, Stephanie decided to stop drinking, and her sobriety lasted for 14 years. She didn't want her children to go through what she experienced as a child.



Just six months after leaving that abusive relationship Stephanie jumped into another one. This time the relationship was healthier. She was together with her partner, Jesse, for 11 years.

“Unfortunately, because of my unhealed trauma I self-sabotaged that relationship with poor decision making and substance use,” she says. “There were a lot of things I should have done differently, and I should have dealt with my depression and self-doubt. Instead, I chose to stuff it all down deep inside.”

Stephanie received a second DUI. “I never thought of myself as an alcoholic. I drank socially and was fine. But then that turned into every weekend and then almost every day. But that wasn’t enough to feed my craving and I started using methamphetamine in 2019. I became the person I promised myself I would never become.”

She adds, “I lost my relationship with my children and Jesse, lost my home, my car and myself. At one point I was homeless. The drugs ran my life...with the depression, the hurt and the anger, I self-medicated with drugs.”

She recounts, “I blamed everyone but myself. I hated life, I cried a lot and I wanted to stop. I missed my kids so much, but it wasn’t enough to stop. I stole from people. I lived in my car, and I even stayed in a tent. The mom I once loved being was gone. I became someone I didn’t know at all. I was so angry with myself.”

Although her children tried to get their mom into rehab, the drugs were too powerful, and she says that nothing mattered except her next high. Luckily, Stephanie’s children were never put into foster care since her former partner stepped in.

The Turning Point

The COVID-19 Pandemic lockdown started in March 2020. On August 24, 2020, Stephanie got arrested for possession of meth and little did she know, it was the beginning of her road to recovery!

“In jail, I prayed a lot and asked God to take away the pain and help me to be the person I was before the drugs. I realized I was powerless in my life. I wanted change.”

“My children visited me in jail for the first time in four months,” she recalls. “That visit was so hard on them, especially my youngest, who was just five years old. He didn’t understand why I was there, why he couldn’t hug me, and why I couldn’t go home with him. I was completely broken. It hurt knowing how much I hurt my children. I knew at that moment I wanted to be a better person for them and for myself, so I chose to fight.”

While in jail, she read books on recovery and spent time thinking about how she wanted her life to change. Stephanie was eventually bonded out of jail. Still facing a year in prison, she decided to work on her recovery and mending her relationships with her children.



DUI Assessments Now Offered

About 1.5 million people (one out of 121 licensed drivers) are arrested each year for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Those arrested often face conviction and are ordered to undergo a DUI assessment. The assessment determines the extent of a person’s alcohol and/or drug use and its associated risk to current and future public safety.

The clinic offers affordable DUI Assessments to expand access to substance abuse treatment services in Johnson, Franklin and Miami Counties. The fee is \$150 (cash, check or credit card accepted).

Although many businesses were closed during COVID, there were two lifelines which remained open during the pandemic—Heartland Regional Alcohol and Drug Assessment Center—known as Heartland RADAC, and HPC. Heartland RADAC assessed and referred her for follow up services to organizations that offered sliding fee scales. She was uninsured, had a felony, no car and little income.

“I couldn't afford addiction treatment centers,” Stephanie says. “I chose Health Partnership Clinic. I am so very thankful for this clinic. I was able to start treatment right away because of the sliding fee scale.” As a federally qualified health center, HPC offers a sliding fee discount program based on income and household size.

The doors at the clinic never closed during the pandemic, and she along with more than 135 patients were treated for Substance Abuse services.

Chris Woodward, LMAC, who is a substance abuse specialist at HPC and works at Heartland RADAC, treated Stephanie.

“Stephanie was able to bring all of her social, moral, and spiritual goals together to process through how she can make the best choices for herself and her family,” he says. “This increased her engagement and her personal desire for change...She was able to use her enjoyment of sobriety to find ways to move past her first recovery skill avoidance to truly engage her higher thought processes to make positive change where her substance use disorder situations are involved.”

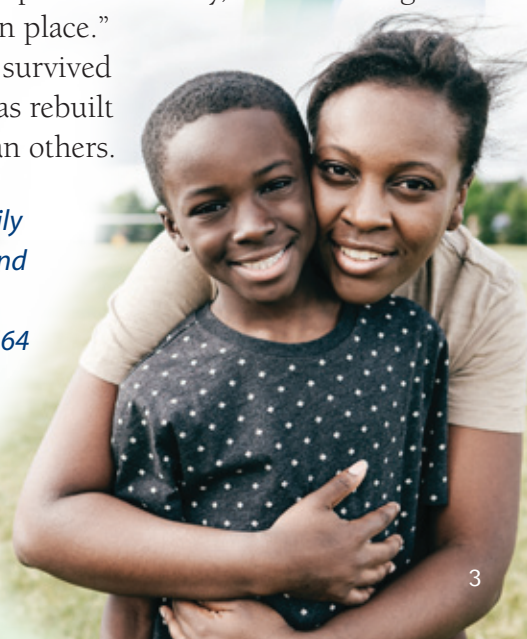
Through therapy and support, Stephanie's relationship with her children began to heal and she was able to be a mom again. At the same time, she started working at a cleaning service and later as an assistant manager at Aldi warehouse. Months went by and she had her final court appearance. “The judge saw something in me, and I was granted probation, no prison time! I continued to work on my sobriety and life continued to go up from there.”

Today, Stephanie enjoys a close relationship with her children, cares for her grandfather with dementia and owns a residential and commercial cleaning company.

“I will always be an addict in recovery, but I now have the tools and the support to stay sober and lead a healthy and productive life,” she adds. “I know that the clinic is just a phone call away, and I have a good support system in place.”

Stephanie has survived the illness and has rebuilt her life and so can others.

Clinic receives funding to keep Olathe children smiling and pain free

In 2023, we screened more than 1,950 students in the Olathe School District Title One elementary schools. Of those screened, the Dental Team detected more than 450 cavities, and 106 children had urgent dental needs. All were suffering with various degrees of pain—making it difficult to eat, play, study and sleep.



That was true for two cousins, age eight and nine years old, attending Fairview Elementary. Thanks to the school nurse, their needs were identified, and she quickly reached out for help to several organizations, including Health Partnership.

“When the boys visited our clinic, both were in severe dental pain,” remembers Christina Cook, RDH, ECP II, dental hygienist and outreach coordinator. “One student needed 15 teeth worked on including

five extractions and the other student had 12 teeth in poor shape, eventually resulting in three extractions.” The treatment has been completed, and the boys are now pain free and enjoying their summer.

“This is a great example of how collaboration and teamwork benefit our children,” Christina notes. “The school nurse worked with our clinic and other area oral health professionals to ensure quality dental care was available and thanks to the generous donation of the Mayor’s Children’s Fund, there was access that was affordable.”

HPC works with many area non-profits to help ensure the children of Olathe receive quality, affordable and accessible dental, medical and behavioral health care.

School-Based Portal Dental Care

HPC provides dental services directly to more than 20 Title 1 schools in the Olathe and Shawnee Mission School Districts. The dental team provides dental screenings and fluoride treatments. Children with emergent needs are scheduled at the Olathe site. We also provide pediatric dental services in Ottawa, Kan.

HPC partners with UHC and Optimists to sponsor Dental Coloring Contest

Excellent oral hygiene is a life skill that children will use for the rest of their lives, and it can impact their overall health and even their ability to grow and learn.

Meet Our Staff

Though hiring can be challenging, we know that the more we can diversify our provider offerings, the better we can connect with the communities we serve. Among our recent hires, the stories of two are especially compelling, and we are excited to share them here.

Inessa Sergeyeva, MSN, APRN, ANP-BC, FNP-BC, and Edward Karanja, MSN, APRN, FNP-C, traveled very separate journeys to arrive at HPC early this year. However, they share our mission: to help treat and educate the community's medically underserved, regardless of their ability to pay.

Perhaps improbably, both Inessa and Edward found their way to Kansas—of all places—having immigrated in the 1990s. She came from Moscow; he from Kenya. And while both left home for a better way of life, Inessa had a strong nursing background, Edward had none.



Inessa's Story

Speaking mostly Russian and Ukrainian, Inessa immigrated to the United States in 1994 with her husband and then nine-year-old daughter. Several extended family members had lived in Overland Park since the 1970s, but the

newcomers knew few others. Many cousins remained in Moscow and still live there. Though she established a nursing career in Russia, Inessa's first U.S. job was as a cashier in Kansas City, Missouri.

Starting over—and over the next 15 years—Inessa learned English; became a licensed practical nurse; earned an associate degree in nursing; and achieved bachelor's and master's degrees in nursing from the University of Missouri – Kansas City School of Nursing. In those years and since, she has worked as a registered nurse, adult family nurse and most recently, as a family nurse practitioner. Additionally, she has earned numerous professional certifications.

Working as a family practitioner at HPC's Olathe clinic, Inessa serves patients of all ages. She is excited to work in community health where she says people need access to healthcare and education, from proper eating habits to a basic understanding of how the human body works. "It's very rewarding to help someone who needs the help," said Inessa.

An Overland Park resident, Inessa and her husband have three adult children. She enjoys travel, gardening, yoga and the outdoors.



Edward's Story

Unlike Inessa, Edward spoke English when he immigrated from Kenya in 1997. Excited by early impressions of America from TV, he was eager to join a family member living in the area working as a certified nursing assistant (CNA). Though he had accounting and transportation

industry experience, he still sought professional fulfillment. He began training as a CNA, at the urging of family.

Having received his certification and encouraged by early work in geriatrics and long-term care, Edward proceeded to earn his bachelor's in nursing and became a registered nurse. "People complimented me on what I was doing, so I decided to advance my career to the highest potential. I got more and more comfortable as I was doing it," said Edward.

Since 2006 at various facilities, he gained experience in skilled nursing, medical surgery, cardiac care and primary care, and he logged more than 800 hours of clinical training as a family nurse practitioner.

Edward applies his family nursing expertise to patients at HPC's Olathe clinic. Having moved from Wichita to the Kansas City area in 2017 for a traveling nurse assignment, he lives in Lenexa and enjoys photography and road biking. His daughter, 22, shares his love for learning and is studying elementary education at Iowa State University.

Besides getting vaccinated each year, here are good health habits to protect yourself:

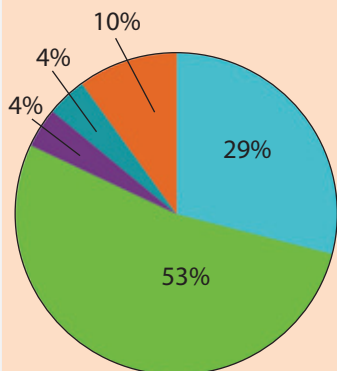
1. Stay home when you are sick.

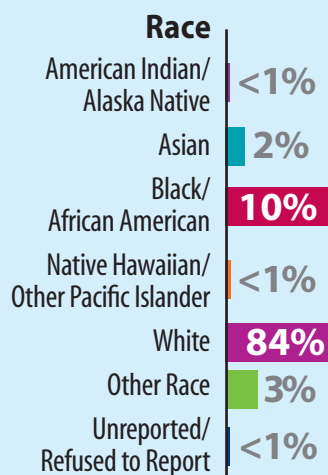

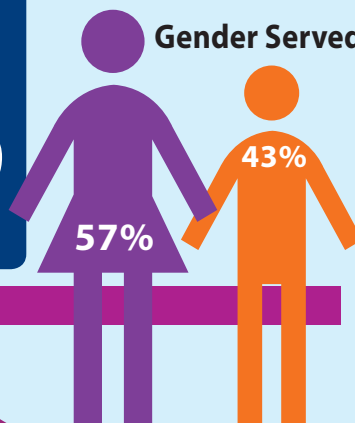

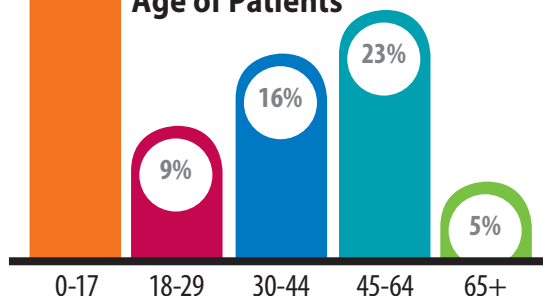

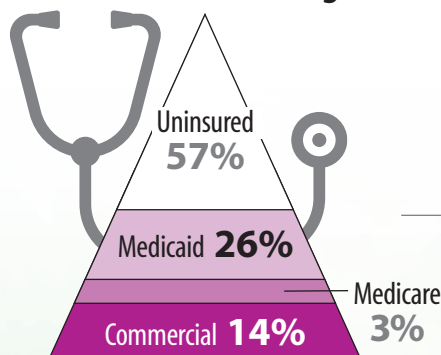
